Planning Director's Report

Review of Development Applications Most Impactful:

- Kingsland School: land handed back to city. Land is municipal reserve, green portion cannot be developed.
- Speed limit at 75th ave: posted at 50km/hr. Requested to reduce limit to 40km/hr
- Walkthrough from 73rd ave to 75th ave (i.e., fence was opened at the 73 Ave. for pedestrians to walk across school yard to 75 Ave).
- Playground committee for rejuvenating 7th ave playground.

Communications Update:

Logo winner: Graham Langbroek

Website: Revamp project: Showed a mock-up of the proposed website layout, colour scheme, and design. Looks great! With budget for project approved, should have a new website sometime in Q1.

Question: What are we doing to continue supporting KCA communications with our older population who may not utilize the website? What about the Kingsland Post? Answer: No changes to the Kingsland Post, it will still be distributed as usual. Content of the post is dependent on advertising content (the more ads the more content in the Post). Our social email list will still be utilized as well. Aside from this, Amanda (our website project lead) will be organizing a website scavenger hunt for the website launch to encourage users to navigate around the new site and get familiar with its functions.

Lifecycle Report: & Hall Maintenance:

A Lifecycle Report (LP) conducted by the city every 5 years on our LOC. Stantec issued Kingsland LP assessment December 20, 2017. This is a comprehensive report which investigated the entire building, rink, sewage drainage, outdoor rink, etc. The LP report is segregated into short-term and long-term action items with recommendations in which year to be replaced. It is the responsibility of KCA to manage the items on the LP.

Deck Support/Shoring

I prepared a report for the city to have issues investigated preschool entrance, deck support beams, ramp, etc. The city granted Kingsland a (Capital Conversation Grant) under the

Engineering Consulting Program (ECP) which the city provided 100% of the funding. IBI/Entuitive conducted a site review July 20, 2020, report was report July 28, 2020.

Jul 23, 2020- Safety Codes Officer's Notice – Permit Number NP2020-02123 July 23, 2020. The city communicated that KCA did not have permit for the deck.

Retaining wall was failing and in turn putting undue pressure on the columns which had shifted from bottom to top, thereby causing the beam to not bear any of the weight of the deck. KCA Safety Code Officer directed us to take immediate measures to avoid risk to the public. Jul 31, 2020 – IBI/Entuitive temporary shoring for the deck was installed, monthly monitoring was scheduled to assess the support integrity.

Oct 21, 2020 - Safety Codes Officer' Notice Permit Number NP2020-02123 Second notice was issued to obtain permit.

City of Calgary engaged ACE Architecture to provide drawings, obtain a permit and manage the replacement of the support beams. Akela Construction did the installation of the beams. ACE registered all necessary documents with the city.

Total cost to repair and stabilize the beams: \$32,519.38 - City 75% - \$24, 389.54 and KCA 25% - \$8,128.85

Community Facility Enhancement Program (CFEP)

Provincial Grant

KCA applied for the maximum small funding stream of \$125,000 in January 2021. We received \$50,000 in September 2021.

The CFEP money (most) will be allocated for design, drawing, and permits to address the preschool entrance - basement stairwell crumbling walls, stairs and drainage as well as enclose the stairwell to ward off street people, secondly new wheelchair ramp to bring it to code. Thirdly, to replace kitchen and flooring. Lastly an expansion under existing deck with heated storage enclosure and shore up the walls.

Once ACE submits the drawings to the city and the plans are approved, it will be early to midspring. The project will go to bid. The bids will be reviewed by KCA for final costs at which time KCA board will determine whether it is feasible to complete all the work from a financial perspective. KCA will apply for CCG-RD 1 2022 grant to cover portion of basement stairwell and ramp. All other costs will be 100% KCA.

Capital Conservation Grant (CCG) - City of Calgary - Round 2

KCA has applied for CCG-RD 2 grant – to cover: New Kitchen, Flooring and Firestopping October 27, 2021

The total is grant request is \$63, 577.50. The city will fund 75% - \$47,683.13, KCA will fund 25% - \$15,894.38.

The city usually takes 6 to 8 weeks to approve the funding. I am hoping to start the work in late spring.
